MAJOR AND MINOR International Security and Conflict Resolution

A Unique Multidisciplinary Program

College of Arts and Letters & International Security and Conflict Resolution **ISCOR** is a unique multidisciplinary program that promotes a comprehensive understanding of contemporary challenges to global and human security.

Founded in 1989, the program on International Security and Conflict Resolution (ISCOR) promotes an innovative, multidisciplinary perspective on issues vital to securing our future. It remains one of the few programs of its kind in California, and in fact, one of the few of its kind in the United States. Located within the College of Arts and Letters, the program draws from courses offered by faculty in other colleges including, Professional Studies and Fine Arts, Sciences, and Health and Human Services.

The Major

The ISCOR major at San Diego State University is an innovative program designed to provide students with a sophisticated understanding of the political, moral, socio-economic, and cultural dimensions of challenges to global and human security. ISCOR exposes students to a multiplicity of ideological, regional, and cultural perspectives, while enabling them to specialize in one of three areas:

Conflict in the Global System

This specialization is concerned with exploring the causes, nature, consequences, management, and resolution of conflict. This provides students with the ability to have a more holistic approach to making sense of conflict in regional and global contexts, while preparing them to think about the possibilities of resolution.

Justice in the Global System

This specialization explores political, economic, and social issues relating to global justice. It includes the study of international

organizations and law, human rights, North-South relations, and controversies over distribution of resources. This specialization enables students to have a richer understanding of the dynamics concerning international security and conflict resolution for specialization.

Environment in the Global System

Consistent with ISCOR's early identification of the interconnections between global security and environmental dynamics, the specialization in Environment in the Global System now offers the most globally in-depth examination of the climate crisis and related environmental issues.

The Minor

A minor in ISCOR allows students to get a broad understanding of global affairs with regard to security, social justice, and climate/environmental challenges. It is a great complement to any major and has value for pursuing a range of postgraduate and professional careers.

International Experiences

All ISCOR majors are required to complete an international experience to increase student awareness of cross-cultural and global issues.

This requirement can be fulfilled in a number of ways to meet the needs of different students, including those with family and work responsibilities, who are unable to leave the country. Options include, but are not limited to, three-week faculty-led programs, semester and year-long study abroad programs, international internships, service and research experiences, and virtual options.

Among the approved options are the International Security and Conflict Resolution 450 courses, which are generally faculty-led programs of three-to-six weeks. Also acceptable, conditional upon the approval of the ISCOR advisor, are 450 courses offered by other departments.
